Maundy Thursday Service

A very warm welcome to our Maundy Thursday Service.

During the service, please join in the words in **bold**.

Maundy Thursday* is a special day for the church. It is the day when we remember the events of Jesus' final evening before his death. There are a number of important elements to this evening, that are picked up during the course of this service.

The Gathering. Just as the room was prepared to celebrate the special Passover meal Jesus was to eat with the disciples, so we prepare our hearts and minds to worship God.

The Washing of Feet. Before the meal Jesus washed the feet of his disciples, giving them an example of humility, love and service. This evening we have the opportunity to place ourselves in that story. You may like to have a bowl of water and towel alongside you to symbolise this act.

The Passover Meal. This meal was the highlight of the Jewish religious year, the celebration of God's deliverance of his people from slavery in Egypt. As Jesus and his disciples shared the meal, they gave thanks to God. We will re-live together the words and actions of that special meal.

The Lord's Supper. But Jesus takes the Passover Meal and gives it new meaning—he becomes the sacrifice through which we are all free. Tonight we remember the Last Supper, and Jesus' act of love and sacrifice.

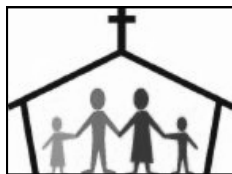
The Watch. After the meal, Jesus went out to the Garden of Gethsemane to pray and find strength in God for the trials ahead. There will be no formal ending to the service. Instead you are invited to continue in prayer for as long as you wish, and then finish when you are ready.

We pray that you will know God's blessing and presence this evening.

* *Maundy* comes from the Latin word *mandatum* meaning "commandment", the word Jesus used on the final evening before his death: "A new commandment I give unto you: that you love one another as I have loved you" (John 13:34)

Against you only have we sinned
and done what is evil in your sight.

Christ, have mercy.

All Christ, have mercy

Purge us from our sin and we shall be clean;

The TABLE is prepared.

The COLLECT, the church’s special prayer for today, is prayed.

God our Father,

may he nourish us by his presence,
and unite us in his love;
who is alive and reigns with you,
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever.

The Washing of Feet



We hear our second **BIBLE READING**—Jesus washes his disciples' feet.

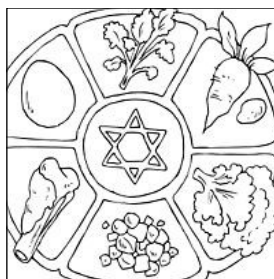
We reflect on this reading.

If you are sharing this service with others, you may like to wash their hands or feet, and be washed in return. If by yourself, you may like to wash your hands or feet and imagine Christ doing it for you.

The washing of hands or feet ends with this prayer:

Lord Jesus Christ,
you have taught us
that what we do for the least of our brothers and sisters
we do also for you:
give us the will to be the servant of others
as you were the servant of all,
and gave up your life and died for us,
but are alive and reign, now and for ever.

The Passover Meal

We hear our third **BIBLE READING**—the story of the Passover.

A candle is lit.

Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation.
Through your goodness we have lamps of fire for light.

All Blessed be God for ever.

The bread is lifted up.

Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation.
Through your goodness we have this bread to share,
which earth has given and human hands have made.

All Blessed be God for ever.

The wine is lifted up.

Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation.
Through your goodness we have this wine to drink,
fruit of the vine and work of human hands.

All Blessed be God for ever.

The youngest person asks the Passover question.

Question Why is this night different from all other nights?

Answer It is the sacrifice of the Lord's Passover, for he passed over the houses of the people of Israel in Egypt, when he slew the Egyptians but spared our houses.

Question Why do we eat bitter herbs? And why is this water salty?

Answer We were Pharaoh's slaves in Egypt, and our lives were bitter with hard service. We wept salt tears in our bondage. The Lord brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand; and the Lord showed signs and wonders, great and grievous, against Egypt and Pharaoh and all his household, before our eyes.

Question Why do we eat a paste of apples?

Answer We were Pharaoh's slaves in Egypt, we were afflicted with heavy burdens, with mortar and brick for building. The paste signifies the mortar we used in our time of bondage. But by the strength of his hand the Lord brought us out of Egypt, from the house of bondage. He brought us out from there, that he might bring us in and give us the land which he swore to give to our fathers.

**All Lord God, you brought us out
from slavery to freedom;
from sorrow to joy;
from mourning to gladness;
from darkness to great light;
from servitude to redemption.**

**This is our faith.
Blessed is the name of the Lord**

*We hear our fourth Bible Reading—Jesus breaks
bread.*



We share the PEACE together.

Jesus says: "Peace I leave with you;
my peace I give to you.
Do not let your hearts be troubled,
neither let them be afraid."

The peace of the Lord be always with you
All and also with you.

We share with one another a sign of peace.

The EUCHARISTIC PRAYER.

At the eucharist we are with our crucified and risen Lord.
We know that it was not only our ancestors,
but we who were redeemed
and brought forth from bondage to freedom,
from mourning to feasting.
We know that as he was with them in the upper room
so our Lord is here with us now.

**All Until the kingdom of God comes
let us celebrate this feast.**

The Lord is here.

All His Spirit is with us.

Lift up your hearts.

All We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

All It is right to give thanks and praise.

It is indeed right to give you thanks,
Father most holy, through Jesus Christ our Lord.
For on this night he girded himself with a towel
and, taking the form of a servant,
washed the feet of his disciples.
He gave us a new commandment
that we should love one another as he has loved us.
Knowing that his hour had come,
in his great love he gave this supper to his disciples
to be a memorial of his passion,
that we might proclaim his death until he comes again,
and feast with him in his kingdom.
Therefore earth unites with heaven
to sing a new song of praise;
we too join with angels and archangels
as they proclaim your glory without end:

**All Holy, holy, holy Lord,
God of power and might,
heaven and earth are full of your glory.**

**Hosanna in the highest.
Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.
Hosanna in the highest.**

We praise and bless you, loving Father,
through Jesus Christ, our Lord;
and as we obey his command,
send your Holy Spirit,
that broken bread and wine outpoured
may be for us the body and blood of your dear Son.

On the night before he died
he had supper with his friends
and, taking bread, he praised you.
He broke the bread, gave it to them and said:
Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you;
do this in remembrance of me.

When supper was ended he took the cup of wine.
Again he praised you, gave it to them and said:
Drink this, all of you;
this is my blood of the new covenant,
which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.
Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did,
in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all
upon the cross.
Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation,
we proclaim his death and resurrection
until he comes in glory.

Praise to you, Lord Jesus:
**All Dying you destroyed our death,
rising you restored our life:
Lord Jesus, come in glory.**

Lord of all life,
help us to work together for that day
when your kingdom comes
and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth.

Look with favour on your people,
gather us in your loving arms
and bring us with all the saints
to feast at your table in heaven.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ,
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father,
for ever and ever.
