

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#### Achieving Peace in Syria

For more information go to sees the West as universally evil and corrupt, by which they can recruit yet more militants to their cause.


So as a people who live in a city itself scarred by bombings, a city now known for peace and reconciliation, how do we respond?

For one thing, by generous hospitality. The battle with ISIL is as much ideological as it is military. Our challenge is to live lives that vehemently deny the distorted

view peddled by extremists of a western world hating Muslims and refugees of all kinds. St Barbara's, as part of a wider network of Anglican churches in the Coventry area, working with the City Council, is now supporting the opening of a church-owned building in Offchurch as a refugee welcome centre. Here, forty refugees at a time will receive two-weeks of training and support in helping them integrate into the UK before being settled elsewhere in the country. It's a small step, but an important one, nonetheless.

Secondly, through refusing to indulge in the language of hate, a language that only further stokes the fires of extremism. The words engraved in the ruins of our own cathedral serve as a powerful challenge to us all: "Father, forgive".

And thirdly, by working and praying for peace. Recent decades have shown with chilling regularity that violence begets more violence, that military force alone does not achieve justice or peace. We need our politicians and world leaders to prioritise finding a lasting, political and humanitarian settlement. Maybe that needs to be the focus of Parliament's next ten-hour debate.

#### A Hive of Activity

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At St Barbara's church, children are an important and very special part of who we are. We love the joy and life they bring to us as a community.

Every week there are special activities for children - our Prayers and Bears service for the under 5s, our monthly Buzz at St B's Sunday afternoon service for young families, our EDGE youth group for young people, and our hosting of the St Barbara's Pre-School.

At our Sunday morning services, most weeks children participate in their own groups,

coming back to the service later on, to share all that they have learnt and done. Called Hive, our children's groups are a buzz of activity, as the children spend time exploring the Christian faith for themselves. Some of the most popular activities include baking (and eating!) crafts, and games. The enthusiasm with which the children share what they have done with the rest of the



church, helping us to learn from them, is a sign of just how much they enjoy it.

Hive caters for children from as young as 18 months up to 14 years of age, with younger children welcome to come along with their parents and carers.

And once a month, usually the second Sunday in the month, we have our Worship for All service. This is a service where we all stay together, from the youngest baby to those aged 100 and above. Through prayer, drama, visual aids, music and discussion, we share together the joy of being a community to which all are welcome.

#### Play-people, Sprinklers and Wise Words

The Christmas holidays often give a good opportunity to catch up with family. Children and parents, grand-children and grand-parents, uncles, aunts, nephews and nieces – Christmas can be a special time of reunions and memories.

I have to say that since I became a parent ten years ago, going to stay with the children's grandparents has become one of the best holidays we have as a family. Not only does it give us the possibility of a lie-in, but we get to see the unique bond growing and developing between our three children and their two sets of grand-dads and grand-mas.

It has also helped me to remember again the special times I had with my own grandparents. One of them, whom we called "Opa", in his eighties, would take me and my two brothers on a tram into the town, where we would go to a huge toy-shop, to look at all the playpeople scenes, before buying us a set each, and then taking us to a café for cake and ice-cream. At other times, he would mischievously turn the hose-pipe and sprinklers on us while we were playing in the garden, soaking us to the bone.

Opa knew how to have fun. And he also knew when to speak words of hope and truth. At the age of 92, when

he began to sense he would not be around much longer, he called each of us 15 grand-children into his study one-by-one, sat us down, and shared with us his faith in God.

We didn't all listen at the time, but the memory of a grand-father sharing with us the most important thing he knew and believed, stayed with us.

At the end of January, the church remembers each year two very special older people and the words they said. Anna and Simeon, who had been waiting all their lives for someone to come and bring hope in the dark times in which they were living, encounter the baby Jesus. And in him, they see the hope and salvation of the world. "This is the one we have been waiting for", they both said. "We can now depart in peace."

Like my grandfather's words, their words may not have been fully taken in at the time, but they have been returned to time and again over the years, their truth and wisdom affirmed.

I wonder what words of hope and light we will want to pass on to our children and grand-children or loved ones? And how can we start doing that now?



#### WHAT'S ON AT ST BARBARA'S

#### **Every Sunday**

#### 8.00am Holy Communion

This is a quiet, meditative service which takes place in the beautiful side-chapel inside St Barbara's Church. The service lasts about 40 minutes and is attended by between 10-15 people each week.

#### 10.00am Parish Communion

This is our main Sunday service, lasting just over an hour, attended by adults and children of all ages. We sing hymns and modern songs, led by an excellent choir, there is a thought-provoking talk, and time for prayer.

It is attended by about 100 people each week and children are especially welcome. We have groups that cater for pre-school, primary and secondary school ages, that meet during the service.

#### Mid-week Service

Holy Communion: Every Wednesday at 11.30am

This is a small, intimate communion service that follows the Book of Common Prayer. It provides a space of quiet and stillness in the middle of the week to pray and reflect, and receive communion.

Prayers and Bears: Every term time Wednesday at 9.30am at Earlsdon Methodist Church. A service for the under-fives and their parents/carers, followed by snacks and crafts
