
## St Barbara's Newsletter is Going Digital—last chance to sign up!

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## Thought for the Season: Presents or Presence?



How are you approaching Christmas this year?

For some of us, we can't wait to get back to all the long-established family traditions: Christmas Day with all the family gathered together, followed by a snooze in front of the TV; Boxing Day out with friends; a New Year's Eve party perhaps.

For others of us, there may have been aspects of last year's more restricted Christmas that we quite liked and are hoping to hold on to. Maybe not having to tear round the country seeing people, often sitting in long traffic jams on the way; keeping it simple and quiet, with less demanding expectations.

And for others of us, we may be approaching this Christmas with feelings of anxiety and worry, wondering how we will afford all the presents and celebrations with food and fuel prices escalating, or wondering how it will

be to go through Christmas without loved ones who have died over the last year.

Every year we come to Christmas with a whole range of emotions and feelings.

It strikes me that must have been true for Mary and Joseph too as they approached what turned out to be the very first Christmas. Mary must have been excited by the imminent birth of her child, but anxious too - for herself and her health, for her child and his future. And Joseph, proud maybe of Mary's fortitude on the long journey to Bethlehem, but maybe feeling a sense of inadequacy too. After all, the one thing that he could do for her - provide a safe, secure place for her labour - was beyond him, as they ended up in a cattle feeding shed.

Here they were, with feelings of excitement and anxiety, pride and inadequacy, on that first Christmas night.

And yet the birth of Jesus transforms it all. Those feelings still remain, but they take on a different perspective. Christ's birth brings hope and joy, wonder and awe. Angels celebrate; shepherds sing; and Mary ponders quietly upon the miracle that has occurred. For God's son is born on earth, God has come to share our lives, to live among us, to bear with us our burdens, to bring us life. The world is changed for ever.

However we are feeling about Christmas this year - whether excited, anxious, joyful or sad - take a moment to pause and contemplate the thought that God's son was born among us. His presence changes everything.

We asked some of the parishioners at St Barbara's what Christmas means to them...

Christmas?

A high-risk strategy for God to be embodied in the human race:

- Risk of perinatal death through infection from animal toxins
- Born into a people living under tyranny
- Born in the act of being forced to register for a census to consolidate oppressive taxes and military power
- The birth of this homeless child being announced with all the language of Roman emperor's birth ("Peace" "Good News") – but addressed to marginalized workers (shepherds) at the bottom of the social scale
- Early exposure to refugee status

This speaks to me of the fragility and risk still of trusting this God who chose to appear at that time, in that place, in that way. It challenges me: am I living for God's fragile and risky way of peace and justice?

To me, Christmas usually means a LOT of busyness – as a musician, I'm getting involved in a lot of concerts and carol services, which is a lot of fun but it's also really important to me, since I personally find music such a powerful way to worship God. It's also really incredible the way that music, and Christmas – and especially music at Christmas! – brings people together. To me, Christmas is very much about people coming together to share love and warmth with each other, but also to experience the love of God – which, even though it's so much beyond our understanding, we can get a sense of it together, even as the days are getting darker.

Christmas to me is an encouraged time of enjoying. You're right to guess that I easily fall into routine and miss out spontaneous fun! So I'm stirred by the approach of Christmas (for me November not August) to think about loving, enjoying and remembering. I love the traditions we've built up in our



family, which are now as enjoyable for their memories as for what actually happens – whether certain films or meals, or ways of giving and opening presents. But I also like small changes, to let the flow of Christmas take a slightly different course each year. And I try to listen to the inner voice saying 'reason for the season' - among the jobs lists to remember God 'becoming flesh and blood and moving into the neighbourhood' as the Message version has John 1:4.
