Prayers and Bears Christmas Special (Wednesday 18 December 9.30am)

Join up with lots of other parents, grand-parents, carers and young children for a short 25 minute service to enjoy the wonder of the Christmas story, re-told for the under-5s. This service takes place at Earlsdon Methodist Church.

Christmas Carol Service (Sunday 22 December 6.30pm)*

Come and join us for a beautiful service of carols and readings, led by our excellent choir.

Christmas Eve Nativity Service (Tuesday 24 December 5.30pm)*

Our most popular service of the year, we begin the start of Christmas proper with this service of carols, drama and prayers, suitable for young and old alike. Come early to make sure of getting a seat!

Christmas Eve Midnight Communion (Tuesday 24 December 11.30pm)

This is a beautiful, quiet service with which to usher in Christmas Day, as we celebrate the birth of Christ among us.

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Thought for the Season: Expecting the unexpected



Still over a month till Christmas as I write this, and snow's already falling in Coventry. I'm sure keen weather watchers will be able to tell us when we last had the white stuff in November, but it certainly feels... unlikely. I wonder if 'expecting the unexpected' is the new normal? Seeing beavers (again) on Autumnwatch, surprisingly flourishing in the English countryside after an absence of 400 years. An England football team getting to the final of a major competition (again). 'Once in a lifetime' weather events (again), devastating floods and record temperatures across the world.

The Christmas story, too, is full of unlikely happenings. A young woman gets a visit from an angel and learns, to her surprise and wonder, that she's expecting a baby. An animal feeding trough doubles as a makeshift, improbable crib for the baby when Mary and Joseph take what accommodation Bethlehem can offer, packed as it is with people returning 'home' for the census. And those visitors: smelly shepherds straight off the hills, unable to contain their surprise at finding things exactly as another wholly unexpected angel visitor had announced; wise

men from the east, with perhaps the most unimaginable Christmas gifts ever...

How do we deal with the unexpected? Worry whether the beavers will thrive after so long away? Cross our fingers, hoping that, this time, football may actually be 'coming home'? Fret about our inability to act resolutely, together, to address climate change?

The Christmas story echoes all those reactions, and more. Life must have felt out of control for Mary and Joseph, unable to bring their baby into the world somewhere tolerably hygienic; unable to stop the flow of curious, curious visitors with strange news and stranger presents; unable to predict the unfolding of a future the angel promised, and towards which those odd gifts hinted.

Yet it's a story shot through with surprising hope. For the unexpected is what we should expect if God does indeed love the world, as the Bible proclaims: loves it enough to send Jesus to renew, revitalise, realign. England may not have won at Euro 24. And the struggle to fit our lifestyles to what planet earth can cope with goes on. But like those beavers unexpectedly remodelling our countryside, the improbable Christmas story is a new beginning that reshapes everything and opens up new possibilities. May you know that surprising, extraordinary hope this Christmas.

Rosie: St Barbara's has been my home church for my whole life - I was baptised, confirmed and married here - so it really is what church is for me!


Alex: I have found St Barbara's to be a really friendly, welcoming community. I have enjoyed worshipping here the last few years and getting to know people.

Harvest Service

On Sunday 13th October we celebrated our Harvest Festival at an all-age service, with many visitors and some cub scouts joining in, including in an activity that involved rearranging the letters of the word "Harvest" into other words to help us in our reflections.

We collected over 20 large bags and boxes of donated food for the Food Bank and were also encouraged to tape a pound coin to any donated tins as part of Coventry

Foodbank's 'can+coin' initiative. We also had an auction of fresh produce after the service. The money raised through the auction, cub cake sales and the "can and coin" offerings, came to over £170, and

has been given to Mission Bolivia's work amongst street children. So thank you everyone!

Thanks also to Earlsdon WI who donated some beautifully decorated willow obelisks to adorn the church for our Harvest service. The obelisks were redecorated afterwards with poppies to feature in our Remembrance Sunday service and will later be used in the garden.
